NATIONAL PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT FOR IMPROVING TEACHER QUALITY

BILATERAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA AND NEW SOUTH WALES

PURPOSE

- 1. This agreement sets out the role and responsibilities of the State of New South Wales ('New South Wales') and the Commonwealth of Australia ('Commonwealth') in relation to the National Partnership on Improving Teacher Quality ('the Partnership'), signed on 29 November 2008.
- 2. New South Wales remains firmly committed to working with the Commonwealth and other jurisdictions to achieve the goals expressed in the National Education Agreement; to improve the educational outcomes of our students to ensure the continued prosperity and progress of Australia; and to encourage young people to pursue productive, fulfilling lives.
- 3. New South Wales enters this Partnership in the spirit of cooperation and commitment to work towards achieving improvement in high-level outcomes for schooling agreed by Council of Australian Governments and set out in the Melbourne Declaration on Educational Goals for Young Australians.
- 4. This Agreement outlines New South Wales' financial, monitoring, reporting and auditing commitments regarding the National Partnership on Improving Teacher Quality.

KEY REFORM AREAS AND INDICATIVE ACTIONS

- 5. New South Wales' Implementation Plan details comprehensive indicative actions against the six reward reforms, in addition to the twelve mandatory facilitation reforms specified in the National Partnership Agreement on Improving Teacher Quality. The Implementation Plan indicates the scope of New South Wales' reform agenda and outlines how the State's reforms under the National Partnership reflect the teacher 'lifecycle' continuum. It also shows the interrelation of the three Smarter Schools National Partnership agreements and the importance of Teacher Quality in underpinning the other two agreements.
- 6. The Commonwealth and New South Wales agree the State Implementation Plan to be a 'living' document, subject to periodic review as agreed by both Parties.

BUDGET

7. Commonwealth facilitation payments and State co-investments to be made in support of the Teacher Quality National Partnership reforms in New South Wales are agreed as follows:

9. In order to achieve the objectives of the National Education Agreement and to sustain the significant national reforms under the National Partnerships, states and territories that receive reward funding must use this funding for education purposes and must

agree the distribution of reward funding with any non-government sectors that are party to the agreement.

NON-GOVERNMENT SECTOR PARTICIPATION

- 10. In developing this Agreement, the Catholic systemic sector was represented by the Catholic Education Commission NSW and independent schools were represented by the Association of Independent Schools of New South Wales.
- 11. The ongoing participation, reporting, monitoring and auditing responsibilities of Catholic systemic schools in this Partnership will be managed by the Catholic Education Commission NSW.
- 12. The ongoing participation, reporting, monitoring and auditing responsibilities of independent schools in this Partnership will be managed by the Association of Independent Schools NSW.
- 13. Commonwealth funding for New South Wales schools will be received by the NSW Treasury on behalf of the State of New South Wales. Facilitation funds will then be disbursed to the NSW Department of Education and Training (DET). NSW DET will, in turn, distribute agreed funding allocations as follows:
 - To the Catholic Education Commission NSW for distribution to Catholic systemic schools;
 - To the Association of Independent Schools NSW for distribution to independent schools; and
 - To government schools (i.e. from NSW Department of Education and Training's allocation of total facilitation funding).
- 14. A detailed breakdown of New South Wales' co-investment contribution is provided in the Implementation Plan.

INDICATIVE ACTIONS AND PERFORMANCE INDICATORS

15. An indicative set of performance measures is provided in the Implementation Plan.

MONITORING AND REPORTING ARRANGEMENTS

- 16. New South Wales will monitor and report on the progress made in this National Partnership as agreed with the Commonwealth and detailed in the Implementation Plan.
- 17. New South Wales agrees to provide reports to the Commonwealth detailing progress against the agreed reform milestones and timelines, as set out in the Implementation Plan. New South Wales acknowledges that summaries of the state reports will be published.

- 18. New South Wales agrees that the Second Annual Report in April 2011 will address the following:
 - o Update on implementation of national facilitation reforms in NSW
 - o Number of scholarships delivered
 - o Number and detail of quality teachers (or sector equivalents) appointed
 - o Number and detail of teacher mentors appointed
 - Number of Centres for Excellence established and the number of schools participating in the initiative
 - Detail of Centres for Excellence illustrating the range of strategies being put in place
 - Number of principals provided with payments to lead School Centres for Excellence
 - Detail of community engagement activities, including university partnerships and Aboriginal community engagement
 - Number and detail of paraprofessionals appointed
 - Number of schools participating in the increased school-based decision-making pilot project and detail of strategies put in place
 - Case studies from individual schools illustrating a range of scenarios operating within the Partnership.
- 19. New South Wales also agrees to share information of best practice arrangements and successful reform interventions with other states and territories through the dissemination of National Partnership annual reports. New South Wales will periodically review the effectiveness of the reforms being undertaken in this Partnership, and will make these results available to states and territories. For more detail on evaluation, refer to the Implementation Plan.
- 20. Monitoring and reporting arrangements will reflect the requirements of Schedule C to the *Intergovernmental Agreement on Federal Financial Relations*.
- 21. New South Wales notes that where agreed Performance Indicators under the NP agreement contribute to the objectives and outcomes of the National Education Agreement, the COAG Reform Council will assess these performance indicators in the context of its analysis and report on the National Education Agreement and its subsidiary NP agreements.
- 22. New South Wales agrees that where individual school data are provided and the NP agreements do not provide for that level of analysis to be published, standard privacy protocols should prevail.

PUBLICATIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

23. The Commonwealth of Australia and the State of New South Wales will acknowledge the Bilateral Agreement as a joint Commonwealth and State initiative in all publications, promotional and advertising materials, public announcements and activities, or any products processes or inventions developed as a result of the implementation of the Bilateral Agreement.

AUDIT ARRANGEMENTS

24. During the term of this Agreement, New South Wales will, upon 7 days' notice from the Commonwealth during normal business hours or as otherwise agreed, permit and provide persons ("Auditors") nominated by New South Wales supervised access to relevant information to verify compliance with the obligations under this Agreement. The Commonwealth is not entitled to use this right of access for purposes that are not related to this Agreement.

GOVERNANCE ARRANGEMENTS

25. This National Partnership and its associated implementation, reporting, accountability and evaluation requirements will be monitored by a cross-sectoral steering committee which will provide advice to the NSW Minister for Education and Training on issues requiring action.
