INTRODUCTION

Child care is an integral part of the Government's strategy to promote the well-being of Australian families. The vast majority of child care funding goes towards the payment of Child Care Benefit (CCB), which assists parents with the cost of child care. In particular, Australian Government Child Care Support contributes by:

- helping families to participate in the economic and social life of the community through assisting families with the cost of child care;
- helping families to balance their work and parenting roles by promoting and supporting the provision of flexible child care services;
- developing and educating children through funding quality child care, quality assurance of child care services and professional development for the child care sector; and
- providing access to early childhood intervention and prevention initiatives for vulnerable families and children through funding quality child care services.

The Australian Government Census of Child Care Services has been conducted regularly since 1986. Census information has been essential for determining how the objectives of Australian Government Child Care Support are being met, and for future planning and policy development.

The information provided in the Census is the most comprehensive data available on Australian Government approved and funded child care. It is used extensively for monitoring growth, operation of services and assisting in policy formulation and planning. Externally the data is made available to State and local governments, peak child care organisations, the Productivity Commission's Review of Government Service Provision and for research into child care.

This booklet details the findings of the 2004 Census of Child Care Services conducted by the Australian Government Department of Family and Community Services. It provides details of child care users, staff and carers and operational details of child care services. The specific week in which services were surveyed is referred to as the 'reference week' for the Census.

The report contains information about 10 service types funded through Australian Government Child Care Support. The following table (Table A) indicates the dates each service type was surveyed.

Note: Some service types located in regional Queensland were surveyed on different dates. In Toowoomba LDC, FDC, IHC and OCC were surveyed 29 March to 4 April, and OSHC was surveyed 29 March to 2 April. In Ayr and Bowen VAC services were surveyed 5 to 9 July. The date variations were due to local public holidays.

A brief description of each service type is included in the glossary in Appendix A. Appendix B shows the complete list of data items collected.

The following points should be noted when analysing data from the 2004 Australian Government Census of Child Care Services and when comparing data from previous years:

- Due to definitional changes, the 2004 Census private long day care and community long day care counts are not comparable with censuses prior to 2002. In 1999 and previously, a service was classified as being 'private' or 'community' depending on the management structure of the service. In 2004, as in 2002, classification is based on the management structure of the legal entity that owns the service.
- Unless stated otherwise, the data in this report has not been weighted up for non-responding services. This is consistent with the data in the previous reports, with the exception of the 1996/1997 Census where data was weighted up for nonresponding services. In comparing counts of services, children and staff across Censuses, response rates must be taken into account.
- ▶ The 2004 Census, 2002 Census and all Censuses prior to that which surveyed family day care schemes surveyed all family day care schemes. However, due to the introduction of Child Care Benefit, the 2001 Census only surveyed family day care schemes using the 'Harmony' software system. For this reason care should be taken in comparing family day care results between the 2001 Census and other Censuses.

- ▶ On 1 July 2000 Childcare Assistance and the Childcare Cash Rebate were replaced by the new Child Care Benefit payment. Child Care Benefit extended eligibility to a wider range of families and increased benefits available by making the income test more generous.
- ▶ The 2004 Census was conducted in March. The 2002 Census was conducted in the month of May, as was the 1999 Census. The 1997 Census, and previous Censuses were conducted in the month of August.

THE CENSUS

Process

Questionnaires were sent to Australian Government approved and funded child care services, which were operational at 3 February 2004.

The electronic lodgement of long day care data was further developed for the 2004 Census. As a result the number of long day care centres using the electronic form increased to 40% in 2004 from 35% in 2002. Family day care schemes have been providing data electronically since 1997, with 91% of the responding schemes providing data electronically in 2004.

Data on service operation and characteristics of the children, parents and staff were recorded. Returned forms underwent clerical and computer checking before being included in the final analysis.

A high proportion of services participated in the Census (see Table 1 of Summary Tables). A total of 8,989 operational services were asked to participate in the 2004 Australian Government Census of Child Care Services. Of these, 7,901 services provided information that has been included in this report. The overall response rate was 88%. Response rates for each service type are: 85% for private long day care centres, 97% for community long day care centres, 98% for family day care schemes, 94% for in home care schemes, 88% for outside school hours care services, 82% for vacation care services, 96% for occasional care services, 100% for multifunctional children's services, 83% for multifunctional Aboriginal children's services, 90% for mobile and toy library services and 100% for Aboriginal playgroup and enrichment programs.

In 1991 the overall response rate of the Census was around 96%, falling to 85% in 2002. The current Census response rate was 88%. Work undertaken in the development and conduct of the 2004 Census, including extensive consultation with child care providers in the development phase and follow-up contacts with services, may have helped to address this steady decline.

All tables included in this report are based on the response rates outlined above, and do not indicate total child care provision. Because the response rate was not 100%, the data cannot be used in absolute numbers. However, the response rate was very high and the results can be regarded as highly representative. The information provides a profile of each service type and can be used indicatively to make comparisons between States and service types and to derive estimates of actual usage.

Context

Child care is an integral part of the Australian Government's Families and children have choices and opportunities outcome as it helps parents to balance work and family commitments and children to learn and develop. Families can access assistance more easily since the introduction of Child Care Benefit and the creation of the Family Assistance Office network. Child care services provide resources for parents such as information, education and links to other services, supporting them in better parenting.

In the six years to 2003-2004, the Australian Government spent approximately \$8.8 billion on child care, and expects to spend a further \$8 billion over this and the next three years. Between the 1999 and 2002 Censuses the estimated number of children using child care increased by 27 per cent, from 577,500 to 732,100, increasing again between 2002 and 2004 by 2.8 per cent to 752,800.

Several child care initiatives aimed at making child care places available were announced in December 2003. These included the provision of an additional 10,000 outside school hours care places and 2,500 family day care places¹. Between June 1996 and September 2004 the number of operational outside school hours care places increased 253% to 253,700 and the number of operational family day care places increased 24% to 74,500.

¹ These places were an advance on the 40,000 new outside school hours care places and 4,000 extra family day care places allocated in the 2004 Budget.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

The following is a summary of the key findings of the 2004 Australian Government Census of Child Care Services, with a comparison to the results of the 2002 Census.

Services

- ▶ The total number of services asked to participate in the 2004 Census was 8,989. The overall response rate for the 2004 Census was 88%. This was an improvement on the 2002 response rate of 85%.
- The number of child care services increased. This growth in the number of services is reflected by an increase of 217 (8%) in the number of private long day care services, and an increase of 15 (1%) in the number of community long day care services. The number of outside school hours care services increased by 34 (just over 1%). Since the inclusion of in home care in 2002, the number of in home care services has increased by 22 (44%).
- ▶ In 2004, the average weekly fee in private long day care centres was \$208, an increase from \$184 in 2002. In community long day care, the average fee increased from \$188 in 2002 to \$211 in 2004.
- In 2004, the average weekly fee in family day care schemes (for 50 hours in care) was \$185 compared to \$163 in 2002.
- The average fee charged per session was \$6.68 for before school care and \$10.28 for after school care in 2004. This compares with \$5.91 and \$9.34 respectively in 2002.

Children

- ▶ There were an estimated 752,800 children attending child care at March 2004 (this includes an estimate for non-responding services). This compares with an estimated 732,100 children attending child care in 2002 (an increase of 2.8%).
- ▶ At March 2004, 79% of the children attending a long day care centre attended that centre for less than 30 hours a week. Fifty-eight per cent of the children attending a long day care centre attended for less than 20 hours a week. This is the same as in 2002.
- ▶ Family day care attendance declined over the period 2002 to 2004. In 2004 an estimated 89,300 children attended family day care during the reference week down from 95,630 in 2002 (a decrease of 6.6%). In March 2004, on average 80% of the children attending family day care schemes attended for less than 30 hours a week.
- In home care experienced a large increase in the number of children attending, an estimated 3,240 in 2004 up from 1,500 in 2002 (an increase of nearly 116%). This increase reflected the steady take up of IHC places. Seventy four per cent of children attending in-home schemes attended for less than 30 hours per week.
- ▶ The number of children attending outside school hours care (before and after school care) in March 2004 was estimated to be 160,800 up from 148,040 in 2002 (an increase of 8.6%).

▶ The proportion of children identified as being from a culturally diverse background increased to approximately 12% in 2004. The proportion of children identified as having a disability remained at about 2%.

Staff

- ▶ At March 2004, an estimated 82,275 paid and around 2,995 unpaid staff (this includes an estimate for non-responding services), including staff working in family day care coordination units, were providing care in Australian Government approved and funded child care services. There were also an estimated 12,018 family day care caregivers providing care in their own homes and 846 in home care caregivers providing care in other people's homes.
 - This compares with an estimated 76,185 paid and 4,336 unpaid staff in 2002.
 There were an estimated 12,816 family day care caregivers and 429 in home caregivers in 2002.
- ▶ At March 2004, 42% of all staff working in long day care centres were employed full-time, 30% were employed part-time, 25% were paid casuals, and 3% were unpaid.
 - This compares to 2002, where 42% were employed full-time, 25% were employed part-time, 27% were paid casual, and 6% were unpaid. Between 2002 and 2004 part time staff numbers increased by 37% in private long day care centres and 12% in community long day care centres, while over the same period the numbers of all other paid staff increased by 2% for both private and community long day care centres.
- On average staff in long day care centres worked slightly longer hours in 2004; 29 hours 10 minutes per week in private long day care services and 26 hours 55 minutes in community long day care centres. In 2002 staff worked on average 28 hours 53 minutes per week in private long day care centres and 26 hours 24 minutes per week in community long day care centres.
- Around 60% of all long day care centre staff had some type of formal qualification relevant to the sector in 2004. This compares to 55% in 2002. Twenty five percent of family day care caregivers and 32% of in home care caregivers had formal qualifications in 2004, compared with 25% of family day care caregivers and 34% of in home care caregivers in 2002.

RESULTS AND ANALYSIS

Services

Of the 7,901 services participating in the Census for 2004, 48% were long day care centres (see Table B below), catering for an average of 89 children per centre (see Table C over) during the reference week. Family day care schemes represented 4% of total services and catered for an average of 278 children per scheme. Outside school hours care services made up 27% of total services, with an average of 67 children per service, while vacation care services (17%) catered for an average of 63 children per service.

The distribution of services varies across States and Territories. There are more private long day care centres than community long day care centres in New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland and Western Australia. This is reversed in South Australia, Tasmania, the Northern Territory and the ACT where there are fewer private long day care centres operating than community long day care centres.

^{1.} Private and Community long day care is not directly comparable between 1999, and 2002/2004 due to changes in the definition of what constitutes a private or community service². The apparently large shift towards community long day care, 1999 to 2002, is most likely a result of this definitional change.

Opening hours

Long day care centres opened on average 10 hours 48 minutes per day with 91% of centres open for 10 hours a day or more. The main use of family day care schemes occurred between the hours of 8am and 6pm. However, family day care also provided extended hours of care. Around 7% of children in family day care received care overnight between the hours of 6pm and 8am. In home care services also provided extended hours of care, however, as might be expected in this more flexible form of service delivery, a much higher proportion of children (18%) received overnight care.

Very few respondent long day care centres operated on weekends, just 21 in total (16 private and 5 community long day care centres), and of these services eight operated on both Saturday and Sunday (5 private and 3 community long day care centres). In March 2004, there were two long day care centres open for 24 hours a day.

In 1999, a service was classified as being 'private' or 'community' depending on the management structure of the service. In 2002 and 2004, classification is based on the management structure of the legal entity that owns the service.

After school care services provided an average of 3 hours 2 minutes of care per day and before school care provided an average of 1 hour 52 minutes of care per day. Vacation care services operated on average 10 hours 33 minutes per day.

Occasional care services were open for 8 hours 20 minutes per day on average.

The average opening time for multifunctional Aboriginal children's services was 9 hours per day, while the average opening hours for multifunctional children's services was 10 hours 1 minute per day.

Fees

The average weekly fee was \$208 for private long day care centres and \$211 for community long day centres. In family day care schemes the average weekly fee was \$185. Outside school hours care services charged on average \$6.68 per session for before school care and \$10.28 per session for after school care. Vacation care services charged an average of \$139 per week.

Occasional care and in home care services usually charge on an hourly basis, with an average \$5.35 per hour being reported for occasional care and \$11.84 per hour being reported for in home care in the 2004 Census.

State comparison




Figure 1: Comparison of weekly fees by service type by State from the 2004

The Australian Capital Territory had the highest average weekly fees for private long day care and family day care, while community long day care average fees were highest in New South Wales. The lowest average fees for private and community long day care were in the Northern Territory, while Queensland had the lowest average fees for family day care (see Figure 1 below).

Variations in fees may be due to a number of factors including different State/ Territory licensing requirements that determine child/staff ratios, accommodation costs and whether the fee includes charges for additional services such as nappies and meals.

Age group fees

For long day care centres, the Census includes tables on specific fees for different age groups ie. 1 year olds, 2 year olds and 3 year olds (the 3 year old fee is usually paid by the 4-5 year old age group as well). During the Census reference week the average weekly fee for 1 year olds was \$217, for 2 year olds \$211 and for 3 year olds \$206.

Utilisation

In 2004, the average utilisation in long day care centres, as measured by total child hours paid for as a percentage of total capacity, was 85% (85% in private and 84% in community long day care). This compares to average utilisation in long day care centres of 88% in 2002 (with 89% in private and 86% in community long day care centres).

In 2004, the average utilisation in family day care schemes was 68%, compared to 77% in 2002. The decline in family day care utilisation can be partly attributed to both the timing of the 2004 Census and to some extent, the allocation of new FDC places just prior to the 2004 Census. Both of these factors impact on the current methodology for calculating utilisation rates, since there were less children using care and more available places.

Children

As at March 2004, it was estimated that around 752,800 children (this includes an estimate of non-respondent services) attended Australian Government approved and funded child care services (this data measures occurrences of care and will include some double counting where children attend more than one service) (see Table D below). This is an increase of approximately 20,700 (or 3%) since 2002. There were an estimated 475,560 children in private and community long day care centres, family day care and in home care schemes, an increase of around 11,290 (or 2%) since 2002.

In family day care, the number of children decreased from 95,630 in 2002 to 89,300 in 2004. This decrease can be partly attributed to the timing of the 2004 Census. Family day care usage reaches its peak around the middle of the school term and tapers off as the school holidays approach. The 2004 Census was held close (one to two weeks prior) to the commencement of the school holiday period, whereas the 2002 Census was conducted mid-term (six to eight weeks prior to the holidays) resulting in a drop in child numbers.

The significant increase from 2002 to 2004 (116%) in the number of children accessing in home care reflects the increased allocation of places made available by the current Government combined with the steady demand for this form of care.

In outside school hours care services the number of children was 160,800, compared to 148,040 in 2002 (an increase of 9%). The number of children in vacation care services in 2004 was 101,710 a 2% decrease on the 103,560 attending this form of care in 2002.



Ages of children

Approximately 92% of children in Australian Government approved long day care services were under 5 years of age (see Figures 2a and 2b below). The proportion of children in care under the age of 2 years increased from 2002 to 2004. Sixteen per cent of children in private long day care centres were under 2 years of age (14% in 2002), 21% in community centres (19% in 2002), 22% in family day care (21% in 2002), and 22% in in home care schemes (22% in 2002).

At the time of the Census, 5% of children in Australian Government-funded long day care centres attended school, the same as in 2002. Around 23% of children using family day care attended school, compared to 24% in 2002.

Hours of attendance per week

While 91% of long day care centres open for 50 hours or more a week, only 3% of children attended care for 50 hours or more. As in 2002, the Northern Territory and the Australian Capital Territory had the highest proportion of children in full-time long day care (40 hours per week or more), 34% and 20% respectively. Tasmania again had the lowest proportion of children in full-time long day care at 6%.

The majority of children in all types of long day care services attended for less than 20 hours per week during the Census reference week. In long day care centres 58% of children attended for less than 20 hours a week, and 24% attended for less than 10 hours a week. For children attending family day care, 62% attended for less than 20 hours and 33% attended for less than 10 hours per week. For children attending in home care, 59% attended for less than 20 hours and 33% attended for less than 10 hours per week.

The trend of increased hours of attendance for children using occasional care continued in the 2004 Census. Only 28% of children in occasional care attended between 2 and 4 hours per week, compared with 30% in 2002 and 40% in 1999. In 2004 as in 2002, 24% of children attended for between 10 and 19 hours per week, compared with 17% in 1999 and 15% in 1996. Ten per cent of children attended for more than 20 hours per week, a steady increase on numbers observed in previous Censuses where 8% was seen in 2002, 6% seen in 1999 and 4% seen in 1996.

Paid hours per week

In long day care centres, paid hours were on average higher than actual hours of care used (26 hours 29 minutes per week paid, approximately 19 hours 53 minutes per week attended). The variation between paid and attendance hours can be attributed to both allowable absences and the difference between actual usage and hours booked and paid for.

In family day care schemes, paid hours were also on average higher than actual hours of care used (with similar reasons for the variation), however the difference was not as large as for long day care centres. On average, 19 hours 15 minutes of care per week were paid for and approximately 18 hours 37 minutes per week were actually used.

Priority groups

Some groups in the population have been designated as a high priority for access to funded child care. At the time of the 2004 Census of Child Care Services, the highest priority group was for children who are at risk of serious abuse or neglect. The second highest priority group was for children of a single parent who is, or of parents who are both, working, studying or training for work or seeking employment. The third highest priority group was all other children.

Within each of these priority groups, the following priorities were applied (in no particular order): children from Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander families, children with a disability, children whose parents have a continuing disability, children in families on lower incomes, children from a culturally diverse background, children in socially isolated families and children of single parents.

Children at risk

Less than 1% of all children using care at March 2004 were referred because of risk of serious neglect or abuse. This has not changed since 2002.

Work-related care


During the 2004 Census reference week 90% of children's paid for hours in long day care centres were for work related care, compared to 88% in 2002. In 2004 the amount of work related care was 91% in community long day care and 89% in private long day care. In family day care 88% of children's paid for hours in 2004 were for work-related care, compared to 89% in 2002.

In outside school hours care the proportion of work related care remained at 97%. Work related care in vacation care has remained fairly steady over time (93% in 2004, 94% in 2002 and 95% in 1999). Forty-nine per cent of children's paid hours for occasional care were for work related care.

Additional needs children

The Supplementary Services (SUPS) program supports Australian Government funded child care services to improve the quality of care provided by increasing the access and participation of children with additional needs and facilitating developmentally and culturally appropriate programs. The priority groups for SUPS support include children from culturally diverse backgrounds, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children, Australian South Sea Islander children, and children with a disability. Where a child has high ongoing support needs, the Special Needs Subsidy Scheme (SNSS) can provide additional support to the service for additional staffing to increase the child to staff ratio, relief for staff/carers to attend specialist training and access to specialist equipment.

Approximately 2% of children in long day care services (including long day care centres, family day care schemes and in home care schemes) were identified as being from Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander families. Indigenous representation was higher in the Northern Territory with 7% of children. These figures compare to 4% of the total Australian population in the 0-4 age group in 2001 (2001 ABS Population Census).

The proportion of children with a disability using long day care (including long day care centres, family day care schemes and in home care schemes) at March 2004 was 2.2%. This is the same as reported in the 2002 Census and compares with 3% reported in the 1999 Census. In 2003 children with a disability comprised 4.3% of the total population in the 0-4 age group (ABS Survey of Disability, Ageing and Carers, 2003). Within all long day care, in home care had the highest proportion of children with a disability (16.0% in 2004, an increase on the 13.8% of 2002). Representation was lower in long day care centres (1.4% overall with 1.2% in private long day care and 1.9% in community long day care) and family day care (3.4%).

The proportion of children using long day care from a culturally diverse background at March 2004 was nearly 12%. This is the same as May 2002. Children identified as being from culturally diverse backgrounds comprised 13% of users in long day care centres, 9% of users in family day care schemes and 4% of users in home care schemes.

Eighteen per cent of all children in long day care centres (private and community long day care) came from sole parent families. This is a similar proportion to 2002. In family day care and in home care schemes 25% of children in care came from sole parent families.

Child Care Benefit

Child Care Benefit replaced Child Care Assistance and Child Care Cash Rebate from 1 July 2000. An estimated 515,915 families (this includes an estimate of non-respondent services) were assisted through Child Care Benefit fee relief at the time of the 2004 Census, up 3% on 2002. It is important to realise that those families that did not receive Child Care Benefit as fee relief are potentially able to claim their Child Care Benefit entitlement as a lump sum at the end of the financial year. Ninety-one per cent of all families using long day care centres, family day care and in home care schemes received some Child Care Benefit as fee relief (see Figure 4 opposite). This was made up of 91% of families using private long day care centres, 88% using community long day care centres, 94% using family day care schemes and 97% of in home care schemes. Maximum Child Care Benefit was received by 33% of all families using long day care centres, family day care and in home care schemes.

Staff

For the 2004 Census, an estimated 82,275 paid staff and 12,864 family day care and in home care caregivers (this includes an estimate of non-respondent services) were involved in providing child care in Australian Government-funded child care services (see Table E below).

While these figures represent paid staff, there were also an estimated 2,995 people (this includes an estimate of non-respondent services) assisting these services on an unpaid basis (eg. Volunteers, work experience students, parents and trainees).

Staff per service

The average number of paid staff per service in long day care centres increased from 11.9 staff per service in 2002 to 12.1 staff per service in 2004. This increase was reflected for both private and community long day services, from an average of 10.9 to 11.2 staff per service for private services and an average of 13.6 to 14.0 staff per service for community services.

Formal qualifications

Sixty per cent of all long day care staff had formal qualifications, compared with 55% in 2002 and 54% in 1999. Private and community long day care centres had equal proportions (60%) of qualified staff. In family day care schemes, 73% of coordination staff and 25% of caregivers had formal qualifications. In in home care schemes, 71% of coordination staff and 32% of caregivers had formal qualifications.

Of staff in long day care centres who had formal qualifications, 81% held a Child Care Certificate or Diploma/Bachelor of Child Care compared with 77% in 2002 and 71% in 1999. Sixteen per cent held teaching qualifications, 4% held nursing qualifications and 10% had other relevant qualifications. Some staff held more than one qualification.

In 2004, there were 40% of staff in outside school hours care services and 41% of staff in vacation care services with formal qualifications. This was an increase on the 38% of outside school hours and vacation care services staff with formal qualifications in 2002. There were 58% of staff in occasional care services with formal qualifications, 48% of staff in multifunctional services and 41% of staff in multifunctional Aboriginal children's services.

In-service training

Seventy-four per cent of all staff (excluding those staff working in vacation care services and Aboriginal playgroups and enrichment programs) and 82% of caregivers undertook in-service training related to child care, financial or management subjects in the twelve months prior to the Census.

Of long day care staff who have undertaken in-service training, 19% undertook training for additional needs children, while 70% of staff undertook other child care related training courses in the previous 12 months. Eight per cent undertook management/financial training and 63% participated in other relevant training (eg. First Aid Certificate).

Hours worked

The hours that staff worked varied with the service type. Sixty one per cent of staff in private long day care centres and 51% in community long day care centres worked 30 hours or more per week. A significant proportion of staff in the Northern Territory (29%) worked 40 hours or more per week in community long day centres. Also, a significant proportion of staff in New South Wales in community long day centres (27%) and private long day care centres (24%) worked more than 40 hours per week. On average long day care centre workers, worked 26 hours 55 minutes in community long day care services, and 29 hours 10 minutes in private long day care services during the week of the 2004 Census.

In family day care, 86% of caregivers worked 30 hours a week or more, with 40% of in home caregivers working more than 30 hours per week.

Major type of work

Tasks that involve direct contact with children take up most time in the working day for 83% of staff in long day care centres. Administrative tasks take up most time for 10% of staff in long day care centres and 54% of staff in family day care coordination units.

Aboriginal Playgroups and Enrichment Programs: Informal self-help gatherings set up by parents to provide their very young children with opportunities to take part in group socialisation and development activities. They are run on culturally appropriate lines, encouraging children to learn and appreciate their traditions.

Additional Needs Groups: The following groups within the population have been designated as having a high priority for funded child care:

- children at risk of serious abuse or neglect
- children of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander families
- children from families with a culturally diverse background. This includes children with a parent born overseas in a country where the first language is not English.
- disability related care—children who have a continuing disability including intellectual, sensory, or physical impairment, or parent(s) with a continuing disability

Age: Age of child as at the reference week.

Allowable Absences: CCB is paid for up to 30 allowable absence days for each child per financial year across all approved long day care, family day care, in home care and specialised outside school hours care services. Allowable absences can be taken for any reason. An absence from an occasional care service can be claimed where the session of care from which a child was absent had been booked and paid by the parent.

Approved Care: Care provided by long day care, family day care, in home care, outside school hours care and occasional care services approved by the Australian Government to receive CCB on behalf of families.

Assessed Income: Assessed income is weekly family adjusted income. Family adjusted income comprises family taxable income, adding in net rental property losses, tax-free pensions and benefits, the value of any adjusted fringe benefits exceeding \$1,000, non-taxable foreign income, and subtracting any amounts a customer pays in child maintenance.

Childcare Assistance: Childcare Assistance was a means tested payment to assist low and middle income families with the cost of child care. Childcare Assistance was paid by the Australian Government to approved child care services on behalf of eligible families so fees could be reduced at the time of care. From 1 July 2000 this payment was subsumed (along with Childcare Cash Rebate) into the Child Care Benefit.

Child Care Benefit (CCB): A payment made by the Australian Government to families to assist with the cost of child care. CCB can be paid to approved child care services on behalf of eligible families so fees can be reduced at the time of care. Alternatively, CCB may be claimed as a lump sum at the end of each financial year by eligible families who used approved care.

Childcare Cash Rebate: The Child Care Cash Rebate paid families a percentage of their work-related child care costs. Care must have been provided by carers who were registered with the Health Insurance Commission. Child Care Cash Rebate provided families with cash reimbursement after they had paid for child care. From 1 July 2000 this payment was subsumed (along with Childcare Assistance) into the Child Care Benefit.

Children Attending: Those children who attended a service during the reference week or who regularly attend but were absent in that week and have paid for the place.

Family Day Care Scheme: A family day care scheme is a network of experienced caregivers who provide care and developmental activities in their own homes for other people's young children. Schemes are administered and supported by central coordination units.

Hours Attended: Refers to actual hours children attended during the reference week. For children who usually attend but are absent during the reference week and have paid for the place, zero hours are recorded.

Hours Paid: Refers to hours paid for child care during the reference week. The number of hours paid will be different from hours attended if the service charge fees when a child is absent from care. For more information on absences see 'Allowable Absences'.

In home care: Where an approved carer provides care in the child's home. Families eligible for in home care include families where the parent/s or child has an illness/disability, families in rural or remote areas and parents working shift work or non-standard hours, families with multiple births (more than two) and/or more than two children under school age, or with a breastfeeding mother working from home.

Jobs, Education and Training (JET) Program: The JET Program provides additional assistance to people receiving pensions or payments through Centrelink because they are sole parents, carers, widowed or low income families.

Long Day Care Service: Long day care is a centre based form of child care service. Long day care services provide quality all day or part-time care for children of working families and the general community. Private operators, local councils, community organisations, employers or non-profit organisations may run these services.

Mobile Children's Service: Mobile children's services are mobile resource units carrying children's services to families in rural and remote areas. They offer occasional care, school holiday care, playgroup sessions, child care, activities for older children, and toy and book library services. They also provide support and advice for parents, including health, social support, welfare and community needs. They may be linked with toy library services.

Multifunctional Aboriginal Children's Service (MACS): MACS is a service designed to help Aboriginal communities with their child care needs as well as with social and development needs. These services can include different types of child care depending on the community needs (eg. playgroups, centre based long day care, occasional care, and outside school hours care).

Multifunctional Children's Service: Multifunctional children's services offer a range of child care services from a single centre, for children o-12 years in rural and remote areas to meet the care needs of both working and non-working parents.

Occasional Care Service: Provides care mainly for non-school children. These services cater mainly for the needs of families who require short term care for their children. This Census includes occasional care centres funded prior to August 1986 and centres receiving the formula funding introduced in August 1986.

Outside School Hours Care Service: Outside school hours care services provide care for school aged children before and/or after school during the school term. Some services also provide care on 'pupil free' days. The services usually make use of established facilities such as schools, community halls, and recreation centres. For the purpose of the Census, services offering both before and after school hours care have been counted as one service, rather than two separate services.

Priority of Access: When the 2004 Census was conducted the Australian Government's Priority of Access Guidelines for services were as follows (in descending order):

- a child at risk of serious abuse or neglect
- a child of a single parent who satisfies, or of parents who both satisfy, the work/ training/study test under section 14 of the Family Assistance Act.
- any other child.

Within each category the following children are to be given priority: children in Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander families; children in families which include a person with a disability; children in families on low incomes; children in families with a non-English speaking background; children in socially isolated families; children of single parents.

Qualifications: Formal qualifications include early childhood related teaching, OSHC specific courses, primary teaching, nursing (including Mothercraft Nursing), a Basic Child Care Certificate (one year), a Child Care Certificate or Associate Diploma (2 years), a Diploma or Degree in Child Care (3 years or more), or other qualifications relevant to the operation of a service (eg. Accountancy, Psychology, Social Work and Business Management).

Service Types: This refers to the type of child care being offered eg. centre based long day care, family day care, outside school hours care.

Special Needs Subsidy Scheme (SNSS): Assists Australian Government-funded child care services to support the inclusion of children with high ongoing support needs into mainstream child care. This includes children with diagnosed disabilities, children undergoing continuing assessment for disabilities or developmental delay, and refugee children who have been subjected to torture or trauma.

Staff: Includes all paid staff and unpaid helpers who worked for the service during the reference week.

Supplementary Services (SUPS) Program: Assistance is available free of charge to child care services to build skills and resources to ensure the successful inclusion of children with additional needs. The priority groups are children with a disability, Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander children, Australian South Sea Islander children and children from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds.

Toy Library Services: Toy libraries lend toys and games to children's services and give advice on their appropriateness to a child's developmental stage. They enable services to provide a variety of suitable toys at low cost. They are linked with mobile children's services.

Utilisation: Utilisation refers to the level of usage of a service, and can be measured in a number of ways:

- vacancy levels
- capacity to take on more children
- average hours of attendance per child
- total hours of attendance over time in comparison to the growth in places.
- in this publication, utilisation is defined as total child hours paid for (where that is collected, total child hours attended otherwise) as a percentage of total capacity.

Vacation Care Service: Vacation care services provide care for school children during the school holidays.

Work Related Care: Care required for children when both parents, or a sole parent, are in the labour force (full-time or part-time), actively seeking work, studying or training for employment. Includes one parent with a disability and not working and the other parent work related.
